Ontario's Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO) manages the licensing and oversight process, ensuring all players on authorized platforms encounter transparent terms, fair odds, and responsible gambling tools such as deposit limits and self-exclusion options.

- Regular audits and game fairness testing are mandated to prevent rigged outcomes.
- Clear rules require operators to provide transparent information on payouts and wagering requirements.
