Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float versions exceptionally unusual and costly.

Rarity Tiers and Finishes

Skins are classified into various rarity tiers, which dictate their drop rates in cases and total eminence.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less typical low-tier items.

- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard weapon finishes found in many cases.
- **Restricted (Purple):** Higher-tier weapons, typically used in trade-ups.
- **Categorized (Pink):** Rare, highly comprehensive styles.
