

Why these animals find their way into Hamilton attics

If you have **squirrels in attic** areas, the reason is usually clear: they found an access gap and a warm, quiet place to nest. In Hamilton, this is especially common because many **Hamilton homes** combine historic construction, post-war additions, and mature greenery close to the roofline. That mix creates plenty of **attic entry points** for determined animals.

Both the **grey squirrel** and the **red squirrel** are active in Southern Ontario, and their behaviour changes with the seasons. Spring birthing season often raises the need for protected nesting spots, while fall brings intense nesting activity as temperatures fall. Signs you may have squirrels in the attic

One of the earliest clues is **noise in the attic**, often occurring at dawn or late afternoon when squirrels are most active. The sounds may include **scratching sounds**, running about, rolling, or gnawing. Homeowners sometimes mistake these sounds for wind, but persistent movement usually means attic pests are present.

You may also notice **feces**, torn **nesting debris**, and visible **damage to insulation**. If squirrels have been there for a while, you may also notice **gnawed wood** around beams or vent openings. In some cases, they damage **wiring**, which can become a serious fire concern.

Because squirrels are capable of creating **rodent-style damage**, many homeowners only notice the problem after insulation has been displaced or a ceiling stain appears. How squirrels are getting inside

Squirrels usually gain access through vulnerable points along the roof and upper walls. Common openings include the **soffits**, **roof vents**, **facia boards**, and **chimneys**. How to keep squirrels from accessing your attic

The best way to stop attic squirrels is a mix of **exclusion**, repair, and follow-up **damage prevention**. First by identifying all likely **entry hole sealing** opportunity around the roofline. Then address each one with materials

that squirrels cannot chew through easily.

Hardware cloth is one of the best materials for protecting vents and openings. It is more durable than plastic mesh and can be fitted over vulnerable areas such as soffit gaps, gable openings, and roof vent edges. If the attic has active squirrels, a **one-way door** or **one-way exclusion devices** may be used so animals can leave but not re-enter.

Common questions about squirrels in attics

How can I tell if squirrels are in my attic or walls?

Check for **scratching noises**, scurrying at dawn or dusk, **droppings**, chewed entry edges, and displaced **insulation**. If the sound seems to move along the roofline or upper walls, squirrels may be travelling between wall cavities and the attic. An **attic inspection** can confirm the source and identify the entry points.

What's the quickest way squirrels from getting into the attic?

The fastest effective method is to identify active **entry points**, install a **one-way door** or other **one-way exclusion devices** if animals are inside, and then complete **entry hole sealing** with durable materials like **hardware cloth**.
