- **Set rigorous monetary limitations:** Treat gambling simply as a form of home entertainment with a fixed budget, rather than a reliable method to earn money.
- **Protect your Steam account:** Enable Steam Guard Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and never log into your Steam account on unproven third-party domains.
