- **Minimal wall impact:** Since the light isn't throwing far beyond the glass surface, the wall remains mostly unaffected.
- **Visual precision:** This style suits minimalist bathrooms where subtlety is key.

From a usability standpoint, edge-lit mirrors provide excellent accent light but often require additional lighting (like overhead or task lights) for functional purposes.

3. In-Glass Light Lines

This approach embeds light lines or patterns directly within the glass surface, creating illuminated features such as lines, shapes, or logos:

- **Decorative accent:** This level of customization can complement sophisticated vanity designs.
- **Busy visual impact:** Caution is advised when pairing with complex stone or tile backsplashes, as the patterns can compete with the texture.
- **Task lighting:** Usually supplementary rather than primary due to the decorative nature.
