- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look extraordinary even at higher wear worths, while others look greatly battered. Understanding how float worths effect rate is vital if you mean to trade or offer your unboxed products.

3. Consider Buying Directly
